## LCLC arena opens to public

Pool, library to open later this year, says GM

BRIDGEWATER - With little hype, the new Lunenburg County Lifestyle Centre arena quietly opened to the public last weekend.
"There was no big hoopla, we just opened the doors," said general manager Kevin Benjamin in an interview on September 30.
Still, there was a steady flow of people who came just to get a look at the facility.
"From the time we opened the doors on Saturday until the time we closed last night [Sunday], there were people in and out constantly. It was nice.
He estimated about 400 attended a South Shore Mustangs game on Saturday night, and the Nova Scotia Major Midget Hockey League team's players were the first to get on the ice during a morning skate that day.
"Our experience this past weekend was phenomenal," said coach Grant Johnston.
"Our boys felt like professional athletes."
An atom AAA hockey team played the first game at the new rink that afternoon, followed by a bantam AA practice.

The arena and galleria are expected to be open for limited hours for perhaps the next month.
"There are some minor deficiencies the trades are working away at," said Mr. Benjamin.
"We're trying to get those cleaned up as quickly as possible, so over the next three or four weeks we won't be opening the doors to the public until 1 p.m. and then we'll have ice rentals from 1 p.m. until close."

## Future of century-old warehouse unclear

LUNENBURG - It's too soon to tell what will happen with the remains of an historic building on Lunenburg's waterfront which was ravaged by fire Friday night.
Emergency crews were called to Montague Street shortly before 7 p.m. where the century-old building was ablaze.

The building, behind the Foodland grocery store, was owned by Scotia Trawler for many years. It was later
sold to High Liner Foods and passed on to Clearwater Seafoods. It is currently owned by the Waterfront Development Corporation, a provincial Crown agency.

The corporation's marketing and communications manager, Kelly Rose, said Monday it's "early days" to consider the building's future. It was not one of the waterfront buildings listed for sale.
It had one business tenant, Echo Bay Marine Limited, occupying office and storage space, but much of the three-storey building was vacant.

## Brothers held on robbery allegations

COUNTY - Three county residents have been charged in connection with a robbery in New Glasgow last week. Police say a Pictou County woman was outside a drugstore there at 5:30 p.m. September 23 when two males approached and sprayed her with an irritant. They took her purse and fled in a white Ford pickup truck driven
by a woman.

They are charged with robbery, wearing a mask while committing an offence and possessing stolen property. The brothers were remanded in custody to appear in court in Pictou County on Monday on the robbery and mask charges. They're due back in Bridgewater on Wednesday to answer to the stolen property allegations.
Police released 20-year-old Rosina Ernst of Bridgewa ter to appear in court at a later date. She faces charges of robbery and possessing stolen property.

## Mouldy classrooms discovered at Park View

## Board says problem has been addressed

BRIDGEWATER - Park View Education Centre has reportedly received a clean bill of health after two classrooms were temporarily closed due to mould growth.
"Whenever we have moisture in schools, we take it very seriously," said South Shore Regional School Board director of operations Steve Prest.
Patchy spots of light grey mould - reportedly a few square feet of it - had been found at the end of summer in two northend classrooms which are partly underground.
Mr. Prest said an overgrown ornamental garden outside the classrooms, high humidity and a lack of ventilation led to the problems.

The board brought in a mould remediation company, which cleaned the site and used dehumidifiers and fans to circulate the air. Meanwhile, the outdoor garden was also trimmed.

Mr. Prest said the board consulted with occupational health and safety staff and the Department of Labour.
"They indicated that as current resolutions to reduce the humidity causes were effective, they confirmed there was not much else we could do other than what we were already doing."

He said although humidity should not be as much of an issue as the fall progresses, other precautionary measures will be taken, such as:

- The head custodian will vigilantly inspect the area.
- The ventilation system will run continuously in the area.
- Fans will operate during off-hours.
- Dehumidifiers will be brought in as necessary.
- The grounds crew will ensure there is no overgrowth outside.
- A report will be provided at the next joint occupational health and safety committee meeting.
- A staff information session will be arranged.


## Man charged in dog death appears in court

COUNTY - A Lunenburg man charged after his dog died this summer after being left in a hot car in Wolfville made his first court appearance last week.
Jason Remai was arraigned on a charge under the Animal Protection Act September 23 in Kentville provincial court.
The 36 year old asked for time to find a lawyer and the case was adjourned until October 21.

Mounties charged Mr. Remai with failing to provide an animal with reasonable protection from heat after investigating the July 21 death of his Portuguese water dog.
A woman discovered the dog in a parked car in a parking lot at Acadia University, where Mr. Remai was attending a meeting.
The woman alerted others in the vicinity. They broke a car window to retrieve the dog and attempted to cool it down and resuscitate it, but the animal did not survive.

# Mahone Bay lists possible shared services 

Board looking to municipal units for future direction

MAHONE BAY - Mahone Bay has dentified six areas where it would like to talk about more municipal co-operation. Town council debated the merits of making a list September 26 after receiving a request from the Municipal Joint Services Board.
That board, which currently only oversees waste management, asked the three participating municipal units for a prioritized list of services they "would like to see investigated" for possible movement.
Mahone Bay, Bridgewater and the Municipality of Lunenburg created the joint services board a year ago after a $\$ 100,000$ consultant study and a later supplemental report by Marathon Human Resource Group looked at regional governance and shared services. The consultants recommended the units use waste management as a starting point to be followed by the addition of other services.
But the request sparked discussion around the table, since officials haven't yet evaluated the success of the current model.

Deputy Mayor Dave Devenne suggested he'd first like to see how effectively the board is able to operate.
"We need to wait for the evaluation. Before we give them more to be responsible for, we have to look at how well they're discharging the duties they have now," he said.
But Councillor Lynn Hennigar, who sits on the joint services board, said the list is just a place to start discussions.
"I think there are at least two partners at that table that want to move forward with services and that you really risk some talent at that table walking away if we don't move forward with something, at least the discussion of what might be next," she said.
"Part of the issue, in my opinion, is that two partners are ready to go with whatever's next," she added. "And one partner perhaps isn't there yet and if that partner is never going to be there this board needs to figure that out really quickly,"

Mayor Joe Feeney, a fellow board member, agreed it's a question of whether it will be a joint services board or just a waste management committee by another name.

Councillor Kelly Wilson, the town's third rep to the board, suggested it's possible to move forward without committing at this point. The board is preparing to hire a chief operating officer and services could impact the needed skill set.
"There's a difference between putting a list together of what's next and doing it," Councillor Wilson said.
"What's the harm in submitting, I call it a wish list," Councillor Penny Carver said. "Why not submit it and see what happens?"

Mahone Bay's list, which was passed unanimously, includes planning, policing, accounting, IT, recreation and human resources. There was no suggestion of priority.
"I'll be fascinated to see where it goes," Mayor Feeney said.

## Jury to hear shooting allegations next May

COUNTY - The Gold River man accused of shooting another man in the leg in July will remain in jail until May awaiting trial.
Ronald Lorne Paul appeared in Nova Scotia Supreme Court in Bridgewater September 26 to have trial dates set in his case.
Mr. Paul, 60, previously elected to be tried by a Supreme Court judge and jury and was committed to stand trial following a preliminary hearing last month.
He initially faced five charges, including a count of aggravated assault endangering a man's life which the Crown dropped last month.
The indictment filed last week now includes six allegations.
Mr. Paul is charged with aggravated as-
sault wounding a man, discharging a firearm with intent to wound, assault with a weapon and breaching earlier release conditions by consuming alcohol.

The Crown added new charges of handling a firearm in a careless manner and storing a loaded firearm.

Police began investigating on July 13 after receiving a call from staff at South Shore Regional Hospital about a patient with a gunshot wound.

A 31-year-old man suffered an injury to his leg at Mr. Paul's home. It was not considered life-threatening, but the patient was transferred to the QEII in Halifax for further treatment.

Mr. Paul was denied bail on July 18. In court Thursday, lawyers suggested seven or eight days will be needed for the trial. The first available dates for both Crown and defence begin May 5

## Accused pill trafficker going to trial

COUNTY - A Pinehurst man accused of having prescription medication for sale is taking his case to trial.
Gary Harold Bushen, 63, wasn't in Bridgewater provincial court September 25, but a legal aid lawyer appeared and entered not guilty pleas on his behalf.

Cathy Benton told Judge Gregory Lenehan she plans to raise Charter arguments when the case proceeds in January.

Mr. Bushen is charged with possession of hydromorphone for the purpose of trafficking and breaching release conditions on April 10.

Police arrested him that night around 9:30 p.m. after stopping a vehicle on Highway 10. At the time, officers said they seized a quantity of hydromorph contin and Dilaudid pills.

Mr. Bushen is currently on house arrest after being sentenced in late April on two counts of trafficking in marijuana in 2011.

Lunenburg Fire Chief Darren Romkey said his department received the first call around 6:50 p.m. At that point, flames were visible from the harbour side of the L-shaped structure.

Sixteen fire departments responded to the blaze from as far away as Chester, Windsor and Kentville. About a dozen were dispatched to Lunenburg with others back-filling at responding fire stations.
Aerial trucks from Lunenburg and Bridgewater at tacked the blaze from the two ends of the building, while other firefighting crews added water from the ground.

The RCMP cordoned off the area to keep onlookers at a safe distance. Officers indicated there were concerns that the building might contain chemicals and that fumes from the blaze could be dangerous.

Chief Romkey said firefighters were aided by the lack of wind and access to lots of water.

Crews did what they refer to as "surround and drown."
"You're basically saying the building's a writeoff so we're going to make sure nothing else goes ... and it worked," he said.

The roof was lost and the wall facing the harbour was heavily damaged, but the remaining walls are standing. The second floor sustained some damage, the chief said, but most of the damage
on the first floor was caused by water.
"I have no idea as far as rebuilding it or anything," Chief Romkey said. "I don't know structurally if they'll be able to do anything or not."
There were some tools and outboard motors stored on the first floor, along with a car and truck. There were also two boats on land just feet from one wall of the structure. The paint blistered on the bow of a cabin cruiser, but the nearby sailboat was untouched except for water, Chief Romkey said.
Thanks to the relatively still night, the Clearwater office building was not at risk, he added. Fire crews doused the roof of the Foodland store to prevent embers from catching and kept an eye on other nearby roofs.

There was no one inside the building when the fire broke out and there were no reported injuries.

The last fire trucks left the scene around 5:30 a.m., Chief Romkey said. One truck returned later in the day to extinguish a hot spot.

The chief said he was "very happy" with the way crews responded.
"Everything definitely did go good," he said. "It was going almost from the ground right up to the third floor before we even got there."

A deputy fire marshal visited the site Saturday and determined the fire was accidental, most likely caused by an electrical problem.

# Forum questions Lunenburg West candidates about Highway 103, long-term care, finances

BRIDGEWATER - Highway 103 twinning, long-term care and the province's financial picture were among topics covered in questions in a recent forum posed to candidates vying for the Lunenburg West legislature seat.
The three candidates in attendance, Mark Furey of the Liberals, David Mitchell of the Progressive Conservatives and New Democrat incumbent Gary Ramey, agreed the province can't alone pay for twinning projects and financial help from Ottawa is needed.
Mr. Ramey said there's a plan to install an interchange in the Ingramport area first.
"That highway over the next five years the twinning will begin from Tantallon to Hubbards," he told the forum held at Glen Allan Drive's Drumlin Hills seniors' apartment complex.
Earlier he talked about the driving habits he's encountered in his travels.
"Rarely do I drive that highway when I can see the grill of the person behind me because they're tailgating me so close," Mr. Ramey told the audience. "If I put the cruise control on ... I put it on at 110 [km/h]. Everybody passes me. Grandmothers pass me. Trucks pass me. Everybody passes me and looks at me like I'm the jerk that's going too slow. People drive too fast ..."
In his comments, Mr. Mitchell said a Tory government would try and leverage federal money soon after taking office. He said, factoring in the number of motorists commuting to and from work, Highway 103 is experiencing more traffic than anticipated.
Mr. Furey said there's no mention or monetary figure specified in the prov-

ince's five-year road plan pertaining to Highway 103 twinning. In the short term, the retired police staff sergeant said enforcement and engineering are key to the issue, while there also has to be public education about the dangers of cellphone use behind the wheel and distracted driving.

Responding to a question in reference to the province's books, Mr. Ramey was adamant Nova Scotia's budget is balanced. "It is balanced and there is a sur plus," he affirmed.

However, his opponents say otherwise.
Mr. Furey suggested government can play with numbers to suit themselves.
"It's a game. It's an accounting
game," he told the audience. "We can't
continue to mislead the public of Nova

Scotia. It's an unacceptable practice."
Mr. Mitchell, a financial adviser for a Bridgewater investment firm, said the Dexter NDP's promotion of the province getting a high praise from a bond rating agency isn't all that it's cracked up to be. He referenced the 2008 bankruptcy of a renowned New York-based financial services company and a banking collapse experienced that same year in Iceland. High bond rating scores were given in both of those cases, Mr. Mitchell said. "While it's great for them [NDP] to say on the face of it things look good, I wouldn't put all my eggs in that basket."
Mr. Furey and Mr. Mitchell went on the offensive when there was a question about long-term-care policy while Mr. Ramey suggested the Dexter government

is working on developing more long-termcare beds but also finding options that would allow seniors to remain in their homes longer.
Mr. Mitchell indicated the bed issue should have been dealt with years ago.
"There are 50 per cent more people waiting for long-term-care beds today than there were in 2009," the Tory candidate said.
Mr. Furey indicated that additional care facilities will be needed in the long term to meet future needs and, in the short term, programs allowing goldenagers to live at home are key.
Candidates also responded to inquiries concerning collaborative health centres, tax credits, public transit, heating costs and other matters.
The provincial election is October 8.

# Liberals tout health-care plan in Lunenburg

LUNENBURG - Using the backdrop of a hospital here that's experienced a number of emergency department closures, Liberals emphasized a plan they believe takes aim at recruiting and retaining health-care professionals.

If they become government, the McNeil Liberals intend to reach agreements with 25 doctors each year to work in what they consider under-serviced areas. They plan to offer tuition rebates of up to $\$ 120,000$ as part of the arrangement. The party's platform also promises to form a committee focused on physician recruitment and identifies a commitment to update the province's nursing strategy.
It's about meeting needs associated with the province's health-care system, Liberal leader Stephen McNeil told a September 27 news conference near Fishermen’s Memorial Hospital.
"Many successive governments have attempted to solve this problem by making several small adjustments to various programs and delivery models but in many ways the unavailability of health-care professionals is a human resource problem," he said.
"Put simply, we need to hire more doctors and nurses and nurse practitioners in our local communities to ensure health care is available when and where we need it. The provincial government must do a better job of aligning our financial resources with the unmet health-care needs of rural communities."

New Democrats say the collaborative emergency centre concept has resulted in huge reductions in emergency department closures. They've said one of those centres is slated to be set up in Lunenburg.

It's bad enough Stephen McNeil and the Liberals don't support collaborative emergency centres which have reduced [emergency department] closures by 92 per cent. But to bring back the health-care system that cost Nova Scotia 1,600 hospital beds and over 1,000 nurses in the 1990s is a big risk," Lunenburg NDP incumbent Pam Birdsall said in a statement released by her party.
Meanwhile, the Progressive Conservatives say in their platform that they'll "increase the number of family doctors in rural communities by providing incentives to those committing at least five years of medical practice in an underserviced area."

The party also promises to work closely with the community.
"Community health boards provide valuable strategic input that goes a long way to help make good decisions in the health-care system," Lunenburg Progressive Conservative candidate Brian Pickings said in a statement released by his party. "Engaging communities and involving local decision-makers will be a key component of our plan to bring real change to the health-care system."

# Chester-St. Margarets candidates square off in debate

CHESTER GRANT - Chester-St. Margarets candidates Liberal Tim Harris, New Democrat Denise Peterson-Rafuse and Progressive Conservative Janet Irwin participated in a two-hour debate in front of students and a few members of the public at Forest Heights Community School on September 25
In opening remarks, Mr. Harris introduced himself as a Nova Scotia businessman and father. He said he wants to serve the people of Nova Scotia.
"Today I'm asking for a job in our community, your community. It's not an easy job. But it's a very important job. The, most important job I've ever applied for," he added.
He was followed by Ms Peterson-Rafuse. She said the NDP has done a lot of work in a short period of time, including investing in corporations to encourage them to come to Nova Scotia. She said Projects, a Halifax consulting firm, came from Alberta to set up in Nova Scotia bringing with it 500 high-paying jobs. She added that IBM will also be bringing 500 high-paying jobs to Nova Scotia when it sets up its first Canadian global delivery centre in Halifax.
Ms Irwin was the final candidate to take the podium. She said while working at CBC she really liked politics but never thought she'd find herself running in an election. She joined the PC party when she learned about Jamie Baillie.
"I became a journalist because I wanted to make a difference, a difference for people and a differ ence for our com munities. Being an MLA would give me that same opportu nity," she added.
Predetermined
questions covered a variety of issues relating to tuition fees, employment, power rates, roads, schools and health-care system sustainability.
Ms Irwin said the PC government has pledged to stop wasteful spending, including reducing the number of district health-care authorities to three. There would be a health authority for the capital district, one for the rest of Nova Scotia and one for the IWK.
"That will reduce spending in healthcare administration which we will then put back into front-line care," said Ms Irwin

Ms Peterson-Rafuse said her government has already reduced health-care administration costs from six to three per cent over its term.
"That is a major challenge to be able to do that," said Ms Peterson-Rafuse. She asked voters to let her party continue its work with the Better Care Sooner plan developed by the NDP which includes creating collaborative health-care centres.
Mr. Harris said a Liberal government will reduce the number of CEOs and vice-

He said he wanted to improve local community-based decision-making fol lowing the example set by Our Health Care Centre which is being proposed for Chester.
Following the questions from the moderators, there was little time to field questions from the audience. However, among the questions on people's minds were rock quarries, rural Nova Scotia, the environment and education.

Chester-area school board member Theresa Griffin said families need access to quality early childhood education, the
most important determinant of health and wellness. She wanted to know what each of the candidates plan to do to support early childhood education.
Ms Peterson-Rafuse said the NDP government has already laid the foundation to move the early years to Education.
"I am proud to say that we have moved the early years under the Education portfolio. There is a lot of work that needs to be done," said Ms Peterson-Rafuse. "To take the balanced approached, what we need to have is more planning. ... In reality, it's not going to happen overnight. But you do need a government that will make a commitment."
Mr. Harris responded that the Liberals believe that universal early child-care education is important but the province needs a federal

partner to fund such a child-care pro gram.
"We need to look at accessibility and affordability of child care across the province," said Mr. Harris, noting his government has committed to investing $\$ 2.6$ million in early intervention programs and $\$ 2$ million in family resource centres in Nova Scotia.
Ms Irwin said a PC government has committed to invest in early learning programs across the province and will have an early learning program in place within 10 years.
In their closing remarks, Ms PetersonRafuse said the NDP has done a lot of work in the Chester-St. Margarets area. She said she brought in $\$ 28$ million worth of roadwork to the area, invested $\$ 3$ million in businesses and non-profit groups, played a lead role in the uranium mining band and buying back Bowater lands, improved Graves Island Provincial Park, secured $\$ 1$ million for the Ross Farm Museum's learning centre, developed the first active living bike lane, and contributed $\$ 900,000$ in renovations to Forest Heights Community School and establishing the skilled trades program, $\$ 500,000$ to the collaborate health-care centre Our Health Centre, renovations to Shoreham Village and bringing seniors' apartments to the area.
Ms Irwin simply encouraged people to get out and vote on October 8. She said the most frustrating part of going door to door is voter apathy. So, she decided to run to make a difference.
"Democracy is tough and democracy is hard work. We all have a voice and if we do our homework we can make a difference. ... Do your homework on this one. It's really important. Look carefully at the three party platforms, at the three party leaders and look carefully at three of us and make an informed decision. It's your right. It is all of our obligation to vote," she said.
Mr. Harris concluded the debate echoing Ms Irwin's comments about voting.
"Please take that opportunity to vote for the candidate of your choice," he added.

Mr. McNeil, 48, is the incumbent in the riding of Annapolis.
His party's hopefuls in Lunenburg County are Tim Harris in Chester-St. Margarets, Suzanne Lohnes-Croft in

Lunenburg and Mark Furey in Lunen burg West.
"Tim, Suzanne and Mark are tremendous candidates, tremendous people," Mr. McNeil explained. "They've done us proud as a party and now it's going to be up to the voters who they want to represent them in the house."

Lunenburg West candidate forum hears about health care

COOKVILLE - The health-care system, its costs and community oversight was arguably a hot-button topic on the minds of those asking questions of candidates seeking the provincial seat of Lunenburg West.
Liberal candidate Mark Furey and David Mitchell of the Progressive Conservatives suggest their parties are committed to reducing senior administration and the number of district health authorities across the province. They say a volunteer community representation will still remain. But NDP incumbent Gary Ramey believes local voices in health care will get lost in the shuffle and won't get heard.
In response to a question at a public forum sponsored by a local business group, Mr. Ramey suggested combined superboard-style health authorities will translate into a "costly mess" that previous governments have attempted. The Dexter NDP have reduced health-care administration costs by over 20 per cent and are still working on further reductions through a shared-services program, Mr. Ramey explained.

The question at the September 26 candidates' forum concerning cutting administration and its impact on the healthcare system was asked by health-care worker Dianne Frittenburg, who also was sporting an NDP button supporting Mr. Ramey's candidacy.
Liberals are eyeing the consolidation due in part because Ottawa plans to reduce health transfer dollars starting next year, which means Nova Scotia will receive $\$ 900$ million less over the next 10 years, Mr. Furey said.
"We cannot continue to function as we do," he told the audience of about 200 people who gathered at a local hotel to hear the candidates.
Mr. Furey said the savings achieved through cuts in senior hospital administration and consolidation means $\$ 13$ million will go back into front-line care.
"This is about hiring more nurses so I don't hear [in the media] every weekend that the [emergency department] in Lunenburg is closed."

The Progressive Conservatives also support reducing the number of health authorities and administration costs. Mr. Mitchell said the focus has to be on care.
"We need to put patients first," the Tory said. "If there is not a payroll clerk in South Shore Regional health it does not affect the front-line care that you get, other than the fact that every dollar you pay that person is a dollar you cannot pay a nurse a doctor or someone else that's going to take care of you as a patient."
Candidates also fielded questions on topics such as school closures and education, highways, electricity rates and support for big business. Other questions from the crowd covered aquaculture, quarry development and MLA pensions.

## Cocaine charges set for trial

BRIDGEWATER - A Bridgewater man accused of selling cocaine to undercover police officers in the summer of 2011 will go to trial at the end of next month.
October 31 and November 1 have been set as trial dates for Matthew Manuel Faustino, who faces three counts of trafficking in cocaine from July 2011.
Mr. Faustino, 26, was arraigned in Nova Scotia Supreme Court in Bridgewater September 26 and entered not guilty pleas to the allegations.
He was one of four men charged following a police under cover operation that summer. The three-week investigation targeted the street-level drug trade of cocaine and marijuana in Bridgewater. The other three men have already been dealt with by the courts.
Graham Jarad Carr, now 26, pleaded guilty to two counts of trafficking cocaine in February 2012 and was sentenced to two years in prison.
Alan Stephen Rankin, 33, was sentenced in May of this year to serve two years and 10 months in custody on a string of charges, which included three counts of trafficking in cocaine.
Gary Harold Bushen, 64, received a year on house arrest as part of an 18-month conditional sentence handed down in April of this year. He pleaded guilty to two counts of trafficking in marijuana.

## Lunenburg takes action on active transportation plan

LUNENBURG - It's not, as they say, rocket science.

There is undeniable evidence today that clearly proves the more active people are, the healthier they are.

And those health benefits do not just result from participating in sports and other intense recreational activities, but include many routine things we do every day including how we get around.

Recently, the Town of Lunenburg engaged the services of consultants CBCL Limited to help draft an active transportation strategy that will provide guidance to the community in determining priguidance to the community in determining pri-
orities for the development of infrastructure and orities for the development of infrastructure and
programs that will encourage residents to be more physically active in their day-to-day living and rely less on automobile usage.
Two evening meetings involving the general public and one luncheon gathering attended by invited stakeholders were held the week of September 23 at the Lunenburg fire hall hosted by town recreation director Robin Scott with presentations by consultants Gordon Smith and Michael Haines.
The stakeholders' meeting which was held September 24 saw a group of about 20 individuals in attendance who were deemed to have specific interests, opinions and observations over what should be included in the development of the plan.

"You've all been specifically invited primarily because of your background and your involvement in active transportation," Mr. Scott said in opening the gathering. "So you have a better feel for some of the issues that may be surrounding active transportation in and around Lunenburg."

The two-hour session included a video presentation on the health benefits of being active and in particular in walking at least 30 minutes a day, five days a week.
That was followed by a question-and-answer period and a walkabout where the group visited selected areas of town with intersections that were deemed by the consultants to be challenging from an active transportation point of view.
"It's your active transportation plan, we bring some of the ideas and knowledge that we have from other places, but you know this particular place better than we ever will," Mr. Smith said. "So there's a dialogue that we want to get happening a little bit on some of these issues, and that dialogue will continue with Robin and the town engineer and different people like that as well as we start to look at some specific things."

Mr. Haines said that active transportation is not to be confused with alternative transportation but rather involves any form of transit that is human powered.
"And of course, typically when we're thinking of that, we're thinking of walking, but it also includes cycling, in-line skating, skateboarding and wheeling $\ldots$ and any other form of non-motorized transport," he said. "Whenever people think of active transportation it's very easy for them, particularly for adults, to think of it in particularly for adults, to think of it in
terms of recreation ... however, we have terms of recreation ... however, we have
to think of it in terms of walking to and from school ... shopping, tourism and work."
He said an active transportation plan is not only about actual physical activities, but also includes such aspects as education, programs, policies and planning.
"It's about the kinds of things needed to create a plan that provides direction for our councils, for our future governments, of where we want to go as a community," Mr. Haines said.
During discussion individual members of the group were each asked, as stakeholders, to come up with one single issue that should be addressed as a priority to make Lunenburg a more active transportation-friendly town.
Responses included more sidewalks, overcoming gaps in the town's street and trail systems, improvements to certain intersections, lack of bicycle lanes in certain areas, paving the trail system that connects old town and new town, a lack of bicycle racks and better signage and directional information for visitors.

Mr. Haines and Mr. Smith's next task is to take the data they have gathered from the public input sessions and use it to develop a course of action for council to consider.

## To boost or not to boost?

## Council wrestles with donation request

LUNENBURG - In the grand scheme of things, $\$ 500$ doesn't seem like a whole lot of money to a town with a $\$ 5.37$ million operating budget.
To some members of Lunenburg council, however, that might be the case.
At their September 24 meeting council referred a request for funding from the Bluenose Academy Seahawks Booster Club to the general government committee for consideration and recommendation.
The booster club was formed at the school this year to assist in raising money in support of extracurricular activities involving sports teams and other clubs which receive no financial support from the Department of Education.
Recently, a written request was delivered to businesses and organizations by a parent representative looking for support for the club on one of three levels - a Tall Ship Booster for a $\$ 500$ donation, a Schooner Booster for a \$200 contribution and a Dory Booster for those giving $\$ 100$

Various incentives and levels of recognition would befall donors depending on the amount of money they have donated.
Included in that is recognition on a sign that will be displayed in the school's gymnasium for the entire school year.

During discussion Mayor Rachel Bailey told council that the Booster Club co-ordinator had run a similar fundraising initiative at Park View Education Centre for a number of years.
"He's dedicating his time and energy in working with the school to offer similar benefits to the students at Bluenose Academy," the mayor said. "It's certainly a feel-good thing ... that's the intention that you are helping students."

She said the program wasn't in the town's "grant stream" as it is a new initiative that just started this year.
"It's a matter of whether we see this as something that we should be supporting," she added.
Councillor Peter Mosher said that while contributing to the club might be good public relations, "I don't know if that's part of the job.
'We are giving taxpayers' money away, so I'm a taxpayer and I see the Town of Lunenburg sign, I say that's my donation, but then if I donate to it I'm really donating twice," he said, adding that the town does provide lots of recreation facilities for kids in the area.
Councillor Tyler Hayden said that parents are often asked to donate towards the cost of such items as uniforms or bus trips, but "a lot of kid don't have that ability.
"So, being able to set up booster club is going to be a huge advantage to making sure that kids get involved in a sport," he said, adding that "active kids are productive kids."
He thinks that students involved in sports would be less likely to get in-
volved in mischief and other destructive activities within the community.
So if anything, this is an investment in cost savings. I guess that would be another way to look at it. As much as it is a feel good, we are investing in helping to make our community active," he said. "I see it as a great investment."
He believes that having the schoolrun recreation programs for youth ages five to 14 actually saves the town money because if the town had to run such programs on their own it would have to hire an assistant recreation director.

Councillor Peter Zwicker, however, agreed with Councillor Mosher in that the town currently does give money for the benefit of students.
"Basically I've given twice, Councillor Mosher has given twice, everybody around the table has given twice," he said. "It just seems like there are so many areas where we need to dedicate our money and I'm not sure a booster club is where we should be spending our money."

He suggested that the parents of the students should be carrying out fundraising events to raise money for extracurricular activities, similar to how the Lunenburg Minor Hockey program fundraises.
Councillor Thom Barclay said that the town donates to the school "on a daily basis," and while he believes the club is a great program, he feels this is a situation where businesses and private individuals should "step up and speak with their own voice and support, and have their own name on the wall
"I've never seen a school function [with] a sign saying sponsored by the town," he said. "I personally have never seen that and that is a good reason not to do it. I sort of see this as an ask of the community at large to do it and not necessarily the town."
Mayor Bailey suggested that con tributing to the club offers a chance to show some leadership "as far as initiatives that are important to the health of our community and the health in the very broadest sense.

Having that school here is key to our economic development and having the school-run programs like this encourage healthy living and healthy engagement in the community and in tegration and in tegration into the community"" she said. "I think it's very important."

# Municipality spends $\$ 56,554$ to install electronic records management system

COUNTY - The Municipality of Lunenburg has tasked a leading document authority firm to supply, install and train staff in a new electronic records management system.
The municipality will pay Ricoh Company, which has offices in Cape Breton and the Halifax Regional Municipality, $\$ 56,554$ to implement the system across all departments within the municipality.
"Records management is a key busi ness process and with a modernized electronic system ... it will enable the municipality to ensure that it adheres to its legal, professional and ethical responsibilities
. while improving efficiency by reducing retrieval time, and space needs," a report to council from municipal clerk April Whynot-Lohnes explained.
The electronic records management is expected to improve efficiency by reducing retrieval time and space needs, and maintains control over what is kept, how it is kept and why it is kept, the report
explained.
"The Municipality of Lunenburg has no electronic system that tracks or classifies its records that are kept and the continual mass filing and data storage both electronic and physical space are becoming overburdened."

The municipality talked three years ago about analyzing the concept of a costeffective, user-friendly application that would work with its computer systems. A committee of the municipality felt Ricoh would deliver a good system.

Ricoh's "experience is reflective in the municipal sector and has a very strong
and competent understanding of the requirements of an [electronic records management system] project in a municipal setting," the report to council explained of the committee's conclusions.
"The committee concluded after discussing with the vendor [Ricoh] during their presentation that they had a strong implementation approach, and would meet all objectives."
The new system aligns with the municipality's goal of delivering efficient and effective municipal services.

## Trial date set in sex-for-drugs case

COUNTY - A trial date has now been set for the final man charged following an investigation into alleged sex-fordrugs exchanges involving teen girls.
Twenty-three-year-old Craig Linwood Ernst of Northfield is charged with trafficking in hydromorphone, along with sexually touching a teen girl, inviting her to touch him and sexually assaulting her between June and September 2012.

His lawyer appeared in Bridgewater provincial court September 25 asking for a trial date. Alan Ferrier suggested a full day will be required to hear the case.

That has now been set for March 24.
Seventy-three-year-old Barry Lawrence Veinot of Mahone Bay is slated to
go to trial November 19.
He faces five charges, including trafficking in hydromorphone, unlawful confinement, sexual assault, sexual exploitation and having anal intercourse, all involving one teen girl. The allegations are dated between June 1, 2012, and April 2 of this year.
Three other men face trials in January in connection with crimes allegedly committed between June and September 2012.

Dustin Craig Collicutt, 23, of Chester Basin is charged with trafficking in hydromorphone.

Brendan Gregory Levy, 30, of Chester is charged with trafficking in hydromorphone and sexual exploitation.
Brandon Clarence Corkum, 21, of Chester Basin faces a single count of procuring a person to have sexual intercourse.


## Council takes next step in utility truck purchase

LUNENBURG - Council has asked Raymond Francis, superintendent of the town's electric utility, to prepare tender documents for the purpose of purchasing a new line truck.
Mr. Francis reported to council last week that the utility's current truck, a 1999 Freightliner, has been requiring an increasing amount of repair
He told council in a written report that in 2012 a total of $\$ 11,509$ in truck repairs was carried out and to the end of July of this year another $\$ 10,780$ was spent.
He suggested council purchase a new unit and keep the 1999 line truck as a spare, housing it in the blue annex building on Victoria Road when it was not needed.
He said the truck was assessed by Geocon earlier this year and required $\$ 2,000$ worth of repairs to the boom in order for it to pass that company's testing.
Another $\$ 2,000$ worth of repairs were needed to replace air lines for the main brakes, install new front shocks and carry out a front-end alignment.
He said other upcoming repairs which will soon be required include new rear tires, repairing the heat-air conditioning belt and replacing a chafed hose in the main boom.
If a new truck is purchased, Mr Francis said the old unit would be kept for setting poles and anchors, lifting transformers and assisting with primary cable changeovers.
He said by setting up a schedule to
run the truck at least once a week and keeping it undercoated, it should last another eight to 10 years.

The new truck would be under warranty for several years depending on the model purchased and would therefore not require any money spent on it for repairs.
"Purchasing a new, smaller truck will be more beneficial to use to change over our new poles as now safety standards require us to put higher poles in," Mr. Francis said. "This would allow us to change over a pole safer and easier within our own utility and not have to hire someone to assist us.'

Should council approve the purchase, the truck would not be delivered until after April 2014 and therefore would be in next year's operating budget
He said that estimates for the cost of a new truck obtained from NSPI were around $\$ 275,000$. There currently is $\$ 143,172$ in a replacement reserve fund and an additional $\$ 425,545$ is in the electric utility depreciation reserve fund and some of that money could be used to pay the balance.
He told council that a trade-in allowance for the old truck would only amount to about $\$ 10,000$.
"My feeling is it's a shame to let that truck go for $\$ 10,000$ if we can use it as a spare," he said.

It will likely take a month to properly prepare the necessary documents needed to put the purchase out to tender and another 45 to 60 days to allow for those tenders to be presented.

LUNENBURG - Council has given the reen light for recreation director Robin Scott to proceed with the establishment of a community-based after-school program for students in Grades 6 to 9
In a written report to council, Mr. Scott said the priority of the program is targeting girls in those grades because they apparently have the biggest drop-off in physical activity, but there is also a desire to hold co-ed sessions so both genders can participate together.
The provincial government will cover the cost of leadership, snacks, equipment, facility rental and other expenses and are "fairly flexible" on how the program is designed

## Chester returns to daytime meetings

CHESTER - The Municipality of Chester has decided not to hold monthly night meetings after all. The majority of council felt the public did not seem of council felt the public
to care one way or to care one way or
the other about once-a-month meetings at night.
In a poll held online, chief administrative officer Erin Beaudin said that 110 people responded to whether council should con tinue to hold evening meetings. She said 59 votes responded "no"; 43 votes, "yes"; and eight votes, they did not care.

Councillor Andre Veinotte said the result of the poll provided statistically useless data because not a large enough sample of the population responded.

Warden Allen Webber added, "Well there is one thing that you can gather from that - nobody cares."
But Councillor Veinotte said that no one would care until the day came they need to come before council and having a night meeting option would be more convenient.

Deputy Warden Floyd Shatford did not agree. He said the lack of response shows that people just don't care if council meetings are at night or not.
"We had 11,000 people that could have voted," he noted.
Deputy Warden Shatford added that having a night meeting hinders council's abilities because all staff are not available during meeting times. He said if council had a question during a day meeting, staff are available.

The staff issue alone is enough, with the lack of people showing that they want evening meetings, is enough for me to keep them all in the daytime," said Deputy Warden Shatford.

He also said it was an inconvenience to the staff that have to attend their meeting to work from 8:30 a.m. until council finished.
"They're tired. They worked all day. This is an issue with having a meeting, in my opinion, at night," he said. "I really believe that if there was an outcry, then we should support it. But I haven't seen that at all."

Councillor Tina Connors disagreed. She asked her constituents to voice an opinion on the matter. She received 27 responses from voters who all wanted council to keep night meetings.
"It think that it's important. I think that an evening meeting encourages opportunity for public turnout, public engagement," she said. "Personally, it would be easier for me to come in the daytime. ... But it's not about me. It's about the individuals that at some point in time want to engage with their municipal unit. We are their council," she added.

She made a motion to continue to have once-a-month night meetings. It was seconded by Councillor Andre Veinotte.
"I don't think it's a big deal to have one a month," said Councillor Veinotte. "It gives people the opportunity. It's not costing us anything really to speak of so why not?"
Warden Webber added that attendance at council is driven by issues.
"They'll show up if they're interested," said Warden Webber. "If people had indicated strongly that they wanted to meet at night, if they started showing up in droves and nobody in the day, I'll stay all day and all night for them. But I don't see any indication that the public is interested in this debate whatsoever." Councillor Connors' motion was defeated. Council will resume holding dayonly council meetings.

I actually began writing this column on the urging of good friend, mentor and former Light house managing editor Marg Hennigar. It was she who suggested that writing such a column would be an excellent vehicle through which I could explore the personal side of the issues in an effort to help people relate to relevant topics of the day.
It is with that philosophy that I continue to write each week, drawing inspiration not only from the events of the day but also from the communities in which I live and work, as well as from my colleagues, friends and family. I enjoy writing this column and if I ever find that it is becoming a chore, then I will know it's time to let it go. However, for right now, I embrace it as much today as I did back in October 1995 when the first instalment appeared in this paper.

At this juncture, I feel I should address a point that comes up fairly often when someone is commenting on the two items that appear under my name each week on this page. While it is true that both items are mostly my opinions there is one marked difference between them. Allow me to explain.

The item on the top half of the page, the editorial, is more factual and always issue driven. While an editorial writer will attempt to lead a discussion or frame a debate on whatever is the hot topic of day, he or she will never inject his or herself into the piece, or at least they shouldn't. Instead, editorial writers rely on facts to back up their arguments and to support their stand. You won't always agree with an editorial. You aren't supposed to, but if done

properly, a good editorial will encourage readers to think about the topic and engage in conversations within the community.

On the other hand, a column, such as this one, which always appears on the bottom portion of our opinion page, tends to be more personal. While in this space I may write something light or even funny, other times I will tackle an issue such as health care, education, the local economy or even a major news event. However, I will always try to bring it home, sometimes to the general community and other times to my own personal world. In doing this, I am attempting to help readers relate to the topic by using our communities or myself as an example

Call me crazy or egotistical if you wish (trust me, I've been called a lot worse over the years), but I believe this formula works because it allows the topic to resonate with readers as they can see how it affects at least one person, family or community.
Are all the columns successful or award winners? No. I'll certainly be the first to admit they are not. Do they all achieve their objective? Not likely. I'd be a fool to think such a thing, but some of that is because, no matter what a writer puts to paper, the success of any particular item depends largely on how the reader interprets what is written. I can tell you, there were times over the past 18 years when I thought I had crafted something a certain way only to find readers have taken it another way.

While I often jokingly say that all my columns are pearls of wisdom that should be treated as gospel, I do so with tongue
planted firmly in cheek. I'd have to be naive and totally full of myself to think such an outlandish thing. I never expect readers to agree with everything I've writ ten, but are the insults really necessary? (I guess maybe they are for some people.) In fact, just the opposite is true and I always encourage the dissenting voice. Debate is a healthy part of the process and essential to freedom of speech.
When I think about the past 18 years, I reflect on everything that has transpired in that time. The world today is a different place than it was in 1995. We've experienced unspeakable horrors in the form of terrorist attacks and wars. We've witnessed natural disasters and struggled through some of the worst economic times in recent history. We've seen world figures fall and die, and new leaders rise up to take their place.
Much has also changed in my personal world since then. My children have grown up. I've lost both parents and many close friends. I turned 50 and had to face all the angst that comes with such a milestone age, but one of the things that remained constant during that time is this column. Through this space you've allowed me into your thoughts for a few minutes each week and together we've talked about the issues, celebrated in times of joy and commiserated with each other when times were difficult. For me, it has been a rewarding experience and, I hope, for you as well. If not, I'm sure you will let me know.

## Banner issue resolved

LUNENBURG - After struggling with how to make hanging banners in town safer for staff of the Lunenburg electric utility, council was told last week that the issue has been solved.
Council had been discussing the problem for several months after utility superintendent Raymond Francis voiced concerns earlier this year over safety issues his crews encounter while stringing banners across Lincoln Street to promote events.
Council looked at several options of alternate locations where banners could be hung and at one point even discussed the possible purchase of an electric sign to use as an alternative.
All those efforts now seem to have been for naught as a simple solution apparently has been found.

We've been experimenting with putting the banners on Lincoln Street as that's pretty much what everybody wants," Mr. Francis told council. "Public works has been assisting us, we pick a time when they could come. It took us a few times to do it, but we find now that it's best to block the intersection [for) the incoming lane and send them in Lower Street."

He said with that arrangement, only one flag person is required to control traffic coming out Pelham Street and incoming traffic on Lincoln Street is no longer an issue.
"It seems to be working fairly well that way," he said, adding it takes about an hour and a half to install one banner.

## Bridgewater seeks firm to design first steps of downtown, waterfront work

## By KEITH CORCORAN

BRIDGEWATER - This town is seeking a firm to formulate preliminary and detailed design work associated with future reconstruction of a section of King Street, a retrofit of the Old Bridge, the development of a new riverside town square, and a downtown parking plan.
Bridgewater has committed up to $\$ 250,000$ toward the design work with $\$ 150,000$ of the total coming directly from town coffers.
The town hopes to award the request for proposals by the end of October with the job starting by November and finishing by April of next year.

The four initial projects were identified in a master plan, a 157-page blueprint completed by a Dartmouth-based consulting firm and released in April that's intended to guide urban planning in and around the town's waterfront and downtown core. The plan is designed to shape the town's future direction for up to the next 30 years and offer opinions and recommendations about how the town can harness the potential of the commercial sector and the LaHave River within town limits.
The plan also factored in results of public feedback, including surveys, workshop feedback and input from public meetings. Visual and physical connections to the LaHave River, the significance of the historic downtown on the west side and modern commercial areas on the east side, and opinions about the north and south parkades were mentioned during a previous public process that included a
walking tour
The design work is associated with four particular socalled first-step projects potentialy on the horizon. A reconstrucion of the section f King Street of King tween Old Bridge Street and Dufferin Street "would integrate improved active transportation infrastructure and amenities into the downtown," reads the request for proposals (RFP).
"Areas of existing conflict, such as the tree-lined paver-stone area between the south parkade and the road, are redeveloped to provide for an unobstructed flow of active transportation traffic.
"Traffic calming measures, such as the bump-outs, will help to slow
through-traffic, making it more comfort able for pedestrian crossings and cyclists. This focus on active transportation is further supported by the installation of further supported by the installation of shorter pedestrian crosswalks, and gen eral widening of pedestrian sidewalks.
"The King Street reconstruction work will also require design of essential subgrade services, including water, sanitary sewer, storm sewer and electrical.

A new open space, called Old Bridge Landing, "shall function as a riverside town square' in the heart of Bridgewater's historic downtown, where people choose to gather for events and leisure during all four seasons," reads the RFP. "This new open space shall function as a continuous active transportation cor ridor linking the park and future plaza on the east side of the bridge."
Concerning an active transportation retrofit of the Old Bridge, "This bridge is considered narrow by current vehicular standards and dangerous by pedestrian standards," noted the RFP. "To improve the safety and functionality of the Old Bridge from an active transportation perspective, a redesign will see the expansion of one side of the pedestrian sidewalk to a [three-metre] cross section and then retrofitted with the old rail and existing lighting. At three meters in width, the pedestrian crossing becomes a multi-use trail crossing safe for pedestrians and cyclists."
Talks with the province will be needed before this concept is designed as the Old Bridge structure is maintained by the Nova Scotia government.
Meanwhile, the RFP describes the downtown parking plan as one that "will identify locations for vehicle and bicycle parking and develop strategies that encourage effective use of new and existing public parking facilities.
"The scope of work for this design will include an exploration of opportunities to shift travel habits and increase the use of alternative transportation modes such as walking, cycling, carpooling, electric vehicles, public transit, etc. These strategies provide multiple benefits by shifting travel away from single-occupancy vehicle travel and working towards reduced parking demand.'
Bridgewater appointed a number of people to an advisory committee that will provide feedback to council in the months and years ahead as work moves ahead to implement the downtown and waterfront plan.
Chamber of commerce manager Dan Hennessey, Ida Scott of the Bridgewater Development Association, South Shore Health's Lisa MacAlpine and Town Centre Development Corporation president Joanne Faulkenham were named to the volunteer panel as stakeholder representatives.
Bridgewater Mall owner Michael Levy and Jim Rofihe of Rofihe's Men's Wear are considered downtown land and business owner reps on the committee. Patrick Hirtle and Peter Oickle were named to the group as resident appointments.

## Pros and cons of new

## database hub at LAC

t's been a promise more than nine months in the making, but Library and Archives Canada (LAC) has finally delivered. Researchers can now access 15 databases from one location

But don't get too excited. Many of these databases have been available previously on-line at LAC (http://www.baclac.gc.ca). They simply weren't organized on one page. The new format, however, appears to have created disadvantages for researchers.
On September 10, the LAC announced the news on their blog (http://thediscoverblog.com): "Mission Accomplished! Access to 15 Databases in One Stop!" But in fact visiting the LAC (http://www.bac-lac.gc.ca/ eng/census/Pages/census. aspx) I discovered 16 links to Canada census returns.
The database contains records from 1825 to 1921. Amongst these are two links for 1841 (both Canada East and Canada West) and three for 1870-71 (Manitoba, Ontario and Canada). The 1921 census is available for free hrough Ancestry.ca.
All documents (except the 1921 census) can be searched by keyword, surname, given name, age and province. One visitor to the blog, however, pointed out that while this new capability was great, they were "disappointed that it [the new database] removed the ability to browse the census records page-by-page." They suggested the LAC reinstate this feature.

The inability to browse images page by page has caused issues with my research in the past. Oftentimes a household began on one page and continued onto the next. Getting to that next page in some databases has frequently proved time-consuming and frustrating.
Furthermore search engines are only as good as the person's ability to accurately transcribe records. If the spelling of a surname was transcribed incorrectly due to human error or horrible handwriting, then researchers may never find it unless they browse every page in a given location. Time and again

I have discovered family members simply by taking the time to search the next or previous page.

This disadvantage aside, the new database hub is like one-stop shopping. Researchers can quickly search all census returns individually without navigating to different start pages or websites. The only thing better would be to enter a name and find the results located in census records in all 16 databases at once.
Perhaps that is the next step.
In the meantime genealogists can consult the list provided by LAC and see immediately which census records are available and which ones exist but are not presently accessible. Information includes year, location and type.
When researchers per-
form a search in the desired census year, the results provide information to help them decide if the person in question is relevant. They can then choose to view the associated digital image in either JPG or PDF to learn more.
Links beneath the Research Aids section provide researchers with additional sources to search for census returns and similar information, including Automated Genealogy, Family Search and Voters Lists.

The central location gives the LAC the ability to easily update the databases to keep researchers in touch with new developments concerning census records The general public can suggest corrections to the indexes, which will - once approved - appear in the database.

It can only be assumed that future releases of Canada census records will be posted to this location, so look for details on the 1926 census in July 2018.

## Twenty-three new bird species for 2013

m amazed at the number of new bird species still being discovered An article in Focus on Wildlife states that a new ground warbler was found in the Philippines, which is the 23rd new species for 2013. This new bird was first described in the August issue of a journal called The Condor.
Earl Meister of Garden Lots sent me an interesting report about Kathy Craig, who was visiting him from Virginia. She went kayaking off Stonehurst and a tern landed on her head and started preening. Kathy had the presence of mind to take a picture with her cellphone of the bird on her head. Her husband, who was in a kayak near by, also observed this.

Mandy Eisenhauer reported two pileated woodpeckers and a sharp shinned hawk at Rhodes Corner. She saw her last ruby-throated humming-

the woods were very quiet otherwise. On Bon Portage on September 15 the banders had a blue-grey gnatcatcher and saw two turkey vultures. On Sep tember 16 a purple martin flew over the island. On September 19 two Philadelphia vireos, three turkey vultures and a good warbler movement were highlights.

I took two people out birding on Sep tember 20 and found lots of warblers about. On that day on Bon Portage Island David Bell let us know that they saw 88 species. Highlights on that day were a Philadelphia vireo, warbling vireos, a willow flycatcher, a turkey vulture, a Cooper's hawk and a prairie warbler. As of September 20 on the island 617 birds had been banded. September 21 produced a warbling vireo, September 22 an American oystercatcher and September 23 an indigo bunting.

On September 18, along Digby Neck, Andy and Kathy Bambi of Shad Bay sent me an e-mail to let me know that he had eight to 10 ruby-throated hummingbirds coming to his one feeder all summer long. He even had them coming to feed out of his hand and sent a picture showing proof of this. His last sighting of one was around September 17. I was told about one of these birds on Brier Island on September 20.

At White Point Marg Millard saw two hummingbirds on September 22. Others were still seeing some elsewhere in the province as of September 23.

Helen Forrest still has a male northern cardinal coming every day to her feeders at Clearland. On September 20, she saw this bird and also another one at Blue Rocks. At Wentzells Lake in Back Centre Steven Hiltz saw four wood ducks, a pied-billed grebe, lots of Canada geese and a solitary sandpiper. A surprise visitor to the farm of Judith Orr at Union Square was an eastern kingbird.

Coming back from Brier Island on September 20, Peter and Linda Payzant reported around 1,000 northern flickers and four kettles total ling 800 broad-winged hawks. The next day I went to Brier Island with some friends and it was relatively quiet. We had very few northern flickers and saw only a few broad-winged hawks, but there was a nice migration of ospreys, sharp-shinned hawks, northern harriers, turkey vultures and lesser numbers of red-tailed hawks, merlins and American kestrels. We had a number of chipping sparrows and on Brier Island an eastern bluebird, immature dunlins and an American golden plover.

At the banding station at Glasgow Head, a blue-grey gnatcatcher and a warbling vireo were good birds reported by Bradley Woodworth.

## Biker wins Atlantic championships

Dan Rudolf claims two amateur road-racing titles

Dan Rudolf isn't your prototypical motorbike racer.
"People are sometimes shocked I have a motorcycle, let alone race," laughed the 41-year-old pharmacist and father of three kids.

Since getting his first dirt bike at age 11, Mr. Rudolf always had a passion for motorcycles, but it wasn't until 2011 when he started racing competitively at the race track in Shubenacadie that he was truly hooked.
"If you love bikes, that's the place to be," said the Lunenburg resident.
"There's a lot of quick fellas on the street here, and I really wish they'd go out and give this a try."

Despite reaching top speeds of over $200 \mathrm{~km} / \mathrm{h}$, he said there's no safer place to ride than the track, given safety gear required, the pristine driving conditions and the things you learn at track school.
"I think those guys would be surprised that if they did the training, they'd be less likely to ride erratically on the street. It's just too dangerous. There are too many variables on the road," said Mr. Rudolf.
"There's no fun riding fast on the street after track school. ... For a lot of people, once they hit the
track, they're done on the street."
Last month, riding his Honda CBR 600, he capped his 2013 season by winning the Atlantic Roadracing League amateur sportbike and superbike championships following a season in which he dedicated himself to a demanding fitness regimen.
"The track is 2.5 kilometres and there are elevation changes - there's one area called the roller coaster - and 11 turns ... you do five or 10 laps, and you're just exhausted. It's a very gruelling track."

His 2013 championships earned him an all-ex-penses-paid trip to the Penguin Racing School in Massachusetts via Inside Motorcycles magazine, and he also won a Canadian amateur sportbike round in July.

After focusing on results this year, Mr. Rudolf is looking forward to competing as a pro next season and remembering why he got into this sport in the first place.
"I'll be against some tough competition, so it'll be different. It'll just be me going out and having fun again and not being concerned about the points."

He'll also continue to make his weekends at the track a family affair, often with his wife and three children camping on site.
"There's a great family atmosphere. That's one of the reasons I keep going back."

# Forest Heights resurrects hockey program

## Sixty-one year old sprints to podium

In 1998, Llew Chase was 46 years old, was out of shape and had degenerative disks in his back.
"I became, through inactivity back then, so crippled I had to go to a back surgeon to see what could be done," said the Conquerall Mills retiree as he fought back tears during a recent interview.
"He told me within two years he'd be doing surgery on my back or I'd be in a wheelchair. At my worst, I couldn't get up off the chesterfield without my wife's help."
That's when a friend of his, Dave Bell, encouraged him to get active.
"I went down and bought a membership at the YMCA," said Mr. Chase.
"Today I still have a back problem, but I've overcome it through exercise."

Within a few years of buying that gym membership, he'd started doing distance running and competing in triathlons, joking he "couldn't afford a corvette" at age ing

By 2012, he'd won five gold medals at the Canadian 55 -plus Games, and earlier this month he placed first in $50-, 100$-, 200 and 400 -metre sprints at the Nova Scotia 55-plus Games despite battling nagging leg problems heading into the event.
"I got through it without really feeling the injuries until the 400 , which is not my race, when I could feel my legs wobbling by the end of it. Had there been another event after that, I probably wouldn't have been able to do it."
Mr. Chase typically trains year-round more than 20 hours a week preparing for competitions.
"He is a prime example of what determination, consistency and patience can
do for a person when they put their mind to achieving something," said his fitness coach, Tammy Slauenwhite.

When Mr. Chase isn't at the gym, he's often with kids young enough to be his grandchildren at the Bluenose Athletics Club.
"It is really awesome to watch the connections between him and the athletes grow throughout the season. We are all so incredibly amazed at his physical ability and so thrilled to have him connected to us as a club throughout the year," said coach Tanya Daniels, adding he's a great example of how people of all ages can stay active and healthy.
"This is the ultimate health care in my opinion, and it has also been a very strong connection for a group of youth to have such a stellar motivated adult role model."

Along with another older running mate, Mr. Chase even competes against teenagers at some open meets.
"You end up being the last ones to cross the line and there's nothing you can do about it," he laughed.
"It's going to end badly. You know that when you come out of the blocks."

Still, he keeps running, and says even if his body eventually forces him to give up sprinting, he'll remain active, fit and involved with athletic people.
"I think I have to do it the rest of my life. I'm quite certain if I stopped, I'd end up crippled again."

In the meantime, he hopes to keep inspiring others his age to stay active, and more importantly, continue to make his 10-year-old granddaughter proud.
"She takes pictures of me running to show at school," he smiled.
"I guess I'm an uncommon grandfather in her circles."

In what's becoming an annual occur rence, the Municipality of Lunenburg's non-profit PRO Kids program has run out of money with months remaining in the fiscal year.
"We're fresh out of funds," said co-ordinator Janice Rand about the program, which provides financial assistance for families in need to allow their children to participate in at least one sport, recreational or cultural activity.
"We can accept applications, but we have to tell people we don't have any money, so unless we have donations or fundraisers or get money from somewhere, then we're going to have to hold those applications."

The municipality had made similar public appeals at this time of year the previous two fiscal years, which begin in April.

For 2013-14, although funding is up
nine per cent to $\$ 38,000$, the number of applicants has increased 13 per cent to nearly 200.
"People are still contributing, and there are fundraisers, it's just that the demand is exceeding the funds."

The bulk of the funds come from the municipality, the United Way of Lunenburg County and individual and business fundraisers.

She said the program offers numerous benefits, such as building healthy communities and lifestyles, developing friendships and social networks, promoting positive behaviours, fostering co-operation and good citizenship, and building confidence and self-esteem.
"It's a real investment in the youth of the district of Lunenburg, that's for sure, and it also builds our local organizations and clubs. It helps boost registration."

## You say potato ...

Dotatoes grow well here in Nova Scotia, and of course they grow like nobody's business on nearby Prince Edward Island (a.k.a. Potatoes Everywhere Island), so they're a great pick as a base for many local food dishes. Not only are they an easy way to eat local, they are the one vegetable that even vegetable dislikers are guaranteed to eat.
Ever hear anyone say, "Ooh, I don't want a french fry - that's a vegetable!" No? I didn't think so. And if they can eat them fried, they can eat them roasted, so there you go.
The easiest way to cook a potato is simply to bake it. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F, poke a few holes in a clean potato with a fork, and bake until tender, about an hour. Enjoy a baked potato topped with butter, pesto, chili or roasted tomatoes. If you get tired of boring old Russets, experiment with Yukon Golds, red potatoes or even some of the purple potatoes that have been cropping up in farmers' markets around the South Shore.
No matter what kind of potato you use, they shouldn't be refrigerated. Potatoes keep best in a cool, dark, dry spot. There's little sense in freezing them, but they are a good candidate for dehydration. To dehydrate, peel if desired, slice and dry for six to 12 hours until crisp. Toss dehydrated potatoes in a bag with other dried vegetables to make a quick soup mix for cold winter nights later this year.
Garlic Roasted Potatoes
A good local potato, especially a young one, doesn't need as many bells and whistles as something shipped from far

away. Try this easy roasted potato dish for breakfast, lunch or dinner.

## Ingredients

$\cdot 2$ pounds new potatoes, cleaned and chopped into bite-sized chunks

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 4 cloves garlic, pressed or minced
- 1 tablespoon minced rosemary, thyme, sage or a combination - 1 teaspoon salt

Directions
Position a rack in the upper third of the oven and preheat to 425 degrees F. Combine all ingredients in a mixing bowl and toss to combine. Spread potatoes out on a baking sheet. Roast until browned and cooked through, about 45 minutes, stirring once.
Curried Potato Soup
This soup includes about everything good in the garden plus curry to boot -a favourite for the first truly cool days of fall.
Ingredients

- 4 tablespoons butter $\cdot 2$ small onions, finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon salt - 3 large carrots, peeled and sliced
$\cdot 2$ pounds potatoes, peeled and chopped into bite-sized pieces
- 6 cups chicken or vegetable broth
- 2 tablespoons curry powder (mild or
hot as suits your tastes)
- 2 large or 3 small tomatoes, diced
- 2 zucchini or other summer squash, chopped into bite-sized pieces
Directions
Combine butter, onion and salt in a stock pot over medium heat. Sauté, stirring occasionally, until onion begins to brown, about five minutes. Add carrots, potatoes, broth and curry powder.

## Twice Baked Potatoes

Four baked potatoes and four cups of stuff: this recipe is an economic and delicious way to use up leftovers. Some of our favourite combinations include cheddar, ham and spinach; Parmesan, tuna and tomato; and mozzarella, sausage and peppers.
Ingredients

- 4 large potatoes
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 cup grated cheese, any kind
- 1 cup cooked beans or chopped cooked meat, any kind
- 1 cup cooked vegetables, any kind Directions
Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Poke each potato several times with a fork to create steam vents. Place potatoes directly on the rack and bake for 75 minutes, then allow to cool for about 30 minutes
Slice potatoes in half lengthwise and scoop out baked insides. Combine scooped-out potato, sour cream, cheese, meat or beans, and vegetables in a mixing bowl and blend thoroughly. Fill potato skins with mixture and return to hot oven for another 40 minutes. Allow to cool for 10 minutes, then serve

# Provincial Hearing owner receives international accolades

Provincial Hearing president Annette Cross received the Hearing Review Professional Leadership Award for outstanding contributions in her field.
The award was presented at the 62nd annual meeting of the International Hearing Society (IHS) in Washington, DC, on September 14 in front of about 600 professionals. The award is presented annually to an individual whose outstanding contributions to the field have advanced the status of hearing-care professionals while providing excellent service to those who suffer from hearing loss.
Ms Cross, who is a Board Certified Hearing Instrument Specialist, said she received the award for helping to maintain the scope of practice within Nova Scotia. But since she is also the IHS Canadian representative on the international board of governors, she also gets called on to help her peers across the country.
Ms Cross started her career in the industry in 1993 as a secretary. She found helping people so rewarding that she achieved board certification in hearing instrument sciences.
In addition to IHS, Ms Cross is also involved with the provincial and Atlantic associations, and she is a board member for the national association and CHIPS (Canadian Hearing

Instrument Practitioners Society). CHIPS supports hearing instrument practitioners on a national, provincial and individual level in order to sustain, promote and develop the profession.

We help each province as they need it," said Ms Cross, noting that each province has their own society of hearing professionals.
"For 10 years, I've been attending most of the symposiums across Canada and building our membership up in the Canadian part of the International Hearing Society," said Ms Cross. "That's very important because we can only be stronger by numbers."

# Municipality of Lunenburg not interested in participating in joint birthday celebration with Bridgewater

COUNTY - The Municipality of Lunenburg won't be part of a shared birthday party next year that would see it mark its 135th anniversary and Bridgewater's 115th milestone together.
The municipality has no intention to move ahead with formal anniversary plans in 2014 sary plans in 2014
and is expected to advise the town that advise the town that
they won't particithey won't partici-
pate in a joint celebration event. The municipality's informal committee of the whole session September 17 agreed to forward the notification to council, which is expected to have enough votes to pass the motion to make it official.
The amount of necessary preparation and staff time were factors in the decision and it's not meant to undermine the growing level of co-operation between Bridgewater and the municipality, Councillor Eric Hustvedt indicated.
A lot of effort went into the district's 125th anniversary, said Tammy Wilson, the municipality's chief executive. The municipality's communications and public relations standing committee, which reviewed the matter, felt 135 years was a milestone that didn't carry similar weight.
"That being said, the committee did feel that it was important for the municipality to indicate to the Town of Bridgewater that we'd be more than
willing to bring greetings on behalf of council and residents of the municipality at any of their events," Ms Wilson explained.
One councillor, Lee Nauss, believed that future amalgamation could impact the municipality's efforts to reach a bigger birthday, such as the 150th, and theorized that council may be missing a "last chance" to celebrate. ## Restaurant built on solid reputation

In 1962, Lenore Cleveland's parents, Florrie and Carroll Mosher, opened a takeout in Western Shore.
This small takeout, the Island View Canteen, had a local following even before it opened. Mr. and Mrs. Mosher were wellknown for their fish and chips stand at exhibitions in Lunenburg, Bridgewater, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick.
The success of their fish and chips led the couple to open the canteen. Since Mrs. Mosher was known for her homemade food and Mr. Mosher was a cook on several boats, their combined skills made a winning combination that has carried on for over 50 years.
The canteen became a local favourite by continuing to build a solid reputation on its seafood.
Lenore began working with her parents during their exhibition days. When the couple opened the canteen, Lenore, who was raising a family on her own by this time, lived across the road and popped by when she could see that her mother was busy.
"When my father came in off the boats, then he would work here," said Lenore, not-
ing that her mother had two employees to keep up with the demands. "But Mom worked straight time. All the time. Day and night."
"I cooked. I waitressed. I cleaned," said Lenore. "Whatever needed to be done."

Since Lenore filled in in every aspect of the business, she was in a good position to take over in 1974 when her mother no longer could work.
"My parents were up around the age where they didn't have to work," said Lenore. Her parents were in their 70s when they finally retired.
The canteen was in a great location with its view of Oak Island. Lenore rec-

In 1984, Lenore added a bakery and started offering home-baked goods.
Lenore's daughter, Natalie Corkum, came into the business just as her mother ognized the potential and dreamed of adding on a restaurant where customers could sit and eat while enjoying an incredible view of Mahone Bay.
"I thought there was a demand for the restaurant.

"I always remember coming here," said Natalie. "We used to come down and fill those little ketchup cups for my grandmother on the weekends. They had a shed out back where they used to peel potatoes with a
would peel potatoes and we used to peel potatoes with a
She began taking on more roles in her teen years and eventually began waiting tables.
"I think I learned how to cook when I worked with my grandfather because he was a talker and I'd go take someone's order and when I'd come back, he'd be gone. He'd be out in the parking lot talking to somebody and so then I had to cook," she laughed.
Since Natalie has spent most of her life in the restaurant, when her mother was readying to slow down a little, it was easy for her to take over. A graduate of community college, Natalie took care of the financial side of the business and has been doing the business' accounting for over 30 years.
Lenore, now 80 years old, although not involved in the business anymore, still pops in every day and even helps out when the restaurant is busy. Natalie said it's not uncommon to see her mother washing dishes or even waiting tables.
"She loves it. She loves talking to people," she said. But working together all these years has not only strengthened their mother and daughter bond, it has created a friendship.
"She's not only my daughter, she's my best friend," said Lenore.
In the last 10 years, Natalie made a few changes such as offering healthier options to its deep-fried fish. Now there are sandwiches, salads and mashed potatoes on the menu.

Besides the seafood, the canteen also became known for its battered wiener.
"Out of curiosity, my mother deep fried a wiener and we've been selling them ever since," said Lenore. "They are absolutely delicious.... She put wiener and batter on the menu and it took off like wildfire."

When Island View first opened, Mrs. Mosher and two employees pretty much handled the entire operation. Now, during the summer season, Island View employs 21 people.
"We've put a lot of people through school," said Lenore about the summer staff.
Natalie, and her brothers, were among those students who always had a summer job. Although her brothers didn't have an interest in the business, Natalie is thankful the restaurant has afforded three generations of her family a good life. However, they both agreed that they would not have been able to continue the business if it wasn't for their husbands and the scores of people who continue to return to Island View for its fish and chips.

## Fire services have need for all skills

There's a place for everyone in the fire service, said Corey Zinck said Corey Zinck of Lunenburg Regional Fire and Emergency Services. He added volunteers don't have to be able to go into burning buildings to become a valued member of a volunteer fire departmenteer
Mr. Zinck said fire departments need so many other people with many different types of
skills in order to run a successful service. He said in addition to those who are able to pull hoses and enter burning buildings, there are also positions available such as fire truck drivers, medical first responders, traffic directors, administrative positions and even fire scene photographers.
"If you've got someone in your community that wants to volunteer to be a photographer at fire scenes, and that's all you're interested in doing, great. There's a need for that," he said. There is also room for volunteer administrators.
"If you have any administrative skills ... and you want to help run the fire department, by all means. want to help run theck us out," he said. "That's perfectly okay."
Mr. Zinck said 20 or 30 years ago firefighters had to be able to haul a hose or enter a building in order

to serve. But that's not the case today. He said most departments have loosened their membership requirements to welcome all skill sets.

Today they have members who only respond to medical calls as well as firefighters who are afraid of heights so only fight ground fires. As well there are firefighters needed for support services at fire scenes whether it be for rehab or bottle exchanges.
"Generally speaking, for every person who is going into a burning building there is at least one or two people for that person for support-type functions," he added.

Mr. Zinck said potential volunteers can come visit the fire department to talk about their interests and how best they can contribute to the necessary service.

COUNTY - Lunenburg Regional Fire and Emergency Services president Corey Zinck said there are few fire calls that fire departments consider false alarms.
He said alarms are designed to sound in the event of smoke or heat. Even if someone has burned their toast, the system is responding in the way it was designed.
"We see a huge volume of alarm calls. But there are not many that we would deem as false," said Mr. Zinck. "When the alarm is received by us, we have to respond to at least verify that it's truly burnt toast for liability reasons. ... We would rather show up for a false alarm and it be nothing or get there early, then there be no alarm in place with flames through the roof. You're always safest to let us come and check it out."
He said sometimes there are alarm system errors that can cause problems but fire departments would rather attend a scene three times for a system error than not show up for a fourth time and it be an actual fire.
In the past some departments have discussed instituting a false alarm fee. But Mr. Zinck said he would be afraid that people would not call the fire service for fear of it being a false alarm and having to pay a fee.
"People pay their fire tax and this is the service we provide," said Mr. Zinck. "Even if it's burnt toast, there is a fluke chance that your burnt toast and inside your wall could be on fire at the same time."
But Mr. Zinck added that if anyone wants to make a donation to any of the 35 volunteer fire departments that exist in Lunenburg County, they would be more than happy to accept.

## Stay attentive when cooking to prevent kitchen fires

During the annual Fire Prevention Week, each year the 35 fire departments in Lunenburg County join their counterparts across North America to bring attention to a strong message about fire prevention.
This year's theme is Prevent Kitchen Fires, as the kitchen is the place where two out of every three home fires begin.
"The biggest thing is to pay attention and don't leave anything unattended," said Corey Zinck of Lunenburg Regional Fire and Emergency Services. "Generally speaking, where most kitchen fires come from is people not paying attention and leaving something on top of their ranges."
When there are children in the home, Mr. Zinck said to keep children at least three feet away from cooking surfaces. And, he added, keep the handles on cookware turned in.
"If you see stuff start to smoke, the next thing is it's going to flash and catch on fire," said Mr. Zinck. He said to remove the pot from the stove. If a fire begins, put a lid on the pot.
"Please don't use hot fat in a pot for deep frying," he added, noting that most people have gotten the message that deep-fat frying on a range is never a good idea.
He said, however, it is a good idea to have a fire extinguisher available but if a fire gets out of control, do not spend a lot of time trying to put it out. It's best to get out and wait for the fire department to do their job.
"If you can't put it out with an extinguisher or you can't cover it, your next move is to call 911 and get out the door," he added. "We've got the tools. We've got the training. We've got the equipment. Make that call."

Cooking brings family and friends together, provides an outlet for creativity and can be relaxing. But did you know that cooking fires are the number 1 cause of home fires and home injuries? By following a few safety tips you can prevent these fires.
-Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, broiling or boiling food.
-If you must leave the room, even for a short period of time, turn off the stove.
-When you are simmering, baking or roasting food, check it regularly, stay in the home and use a timer to remind you.
-If you have young children, use the stove's back burners whenever possible. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the stove.
-When you cook, wear clothing with tight-fitting sleeves.
-Keep potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper and plastic bags, towels and anything else that can burn away from your stovetop.
-Clean up food and grease from burners and stovetops.

## Some safety advice for a safe and cosy fire-free fall

As temperatures drop and the annual hibernation routine begins, we start using heating appliances such as the furnace, fireplace, and space heaters for the first time in months. To avoid potential hazards, check every autumn that these are still in good condition and follow precautions for proper use.

## Furnace:

- Have a qualified heating contractor perform a yearly maintenance check of your furnace and venting system.
- Clean or replace your furnace filter frequently during the heating season
- Keep the immediate area free of obstructions to ensure free air flow.
- Never use gasoline or other flammable liquids near your gas furnace.
- Don't store combustible materials such as paper, chemicals, paint, rags and cleaning products close to your gas furnace.


## Gas fireplace:

- Check that the glass panel is intact. Do not use your gas fireplace if the glass panel is removed, cracked or broken. Glass panels and frame assemblies should only be replaced by a qualified service person.


## Space heaters:

- Check for wear on the electrical cord. If it's damaged, replace the entire unit or have the cord replaced by a qualified repair person.
- Keep it clean by dusting or vacuuming it regularly. Always turn the unit off first.
- Keep the heater clear of furniture, rugs and drapes to allow free air movement and avoid overheating.

- Turn the heater down or off before going to sleep and keep it out of pathways and well away from bedding and clothes. Turn it off when leaving the house.
- Install a smoke alarm in the room with the space heater.
- Have working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms installed throughout the home.

Question: As an MLA, what's going to make you different and stand out from your competitors?
Janet Irwin (JI): "I think what will make me different and stand out comes from what I learned as a journalist. When I was a journalist I felt that I gave voice to people who needed help and I feel that being a good MLA for Chester-St. Margarets, you do exactly the same thing I have heard from a lot of people who not only need help, they are afraid. They're afraid that they can't pay their power bills. They're afraid that they're not going to be able to heat their homes this winter and I'm seeing a lot of people who're having to make decisions they should never have to make and I feel that I can give them a voice to help their lives."
Tim Harris (TH): "I've been in small business for 25 years. I've been very successful. I think that's the first standout piece about me. I think how I'm going to stand out is how I approach the job. I'm extremely serious about rebuilding our riding as a vibrant business area. I believe in [Liberal leader] Stephen McNeil's platform in small business incentives. I think we as a party and myself as an MLA are going to shine in our ability to help bring the South Shore back.
Denise Peterson-Rafuse (DPR): "What I believe will make a difference this election is the past four and a half years and all of the work that I have done for the constituency. There's been many things that have been implemented here that have not been done in the past I've been able to get senior housing. I've been able to get, for the first time in all of the province, an active stone bridge with a historical designation, $\$ 28$ million worth of road improvements and I know that's very important within the rural constituency. I also took a lead role with the provincial government in the buy-back Bowaters. That was critical. If we wouldn't have taken that initiative there's no question that those lands now would probably be in the hands of the Chinese government because they were looking at purchasing them. I'm hoping that people will, when they go to vote, that they'll sit down and think about all the work that Denise PetersonRafuse has done in four and a half years and a lot of it is visual work too that they can see.
Q: Fewer and fewer eligible voters bother to vote at election time. To a degree it's cynicism. What's your message to people who've lost their faith in politics and politicians?

JI: "I've met a lot of people at the door who have lost faith. I got into journalism because I wanted to make a difference. I got into this for the same thing. I want to make a difference. If you don't get involved nothing's ever going to change. We can't make any difference if we don't have people involved and with fewer and fewer people voting it's just going to get worse and worse.
TH: "Just the other day I heard on the doorstep an individual said, 'I'm going to vote but I'm considering spoiling my ballot as a protest to the way things are. The reason that she was going to vote was because many people lost their lives to give us freedom and give us the

opportunity of democracy and the ability to vote. I think the biggest thing that anybody looking at our democracy and considering not voting is it's an insult to all those people that have gone before us to ensure that we have a democratic society and we have the opportunity to vote. So, I think if anybody approached me to ask me why they should vote it's because of our legacy from our veterans from people before us including my father that fought in the war, fought for freedom and fought for the vote."
DPR: "It's so important to vote and along with that it's very important to get the right information. There's a great deal of misinformation. The opposition is doing their job to make it look like when you're in government you're not doing the right things and plus it depends on who's writing a story what their political background may be. When you look at a story and read it in the media or you hear it, ask yourself if you're hearing both sides. I know that people feel that there's a disappoint ment because of the many years of disappointments. We have many firsts. There's over 50 accomplishments with over half of them being firsts for this province so you have to question why those were not done in the past. When I go to the door, I encourage people to think about that and to give us an opportunity to take the next step further."
Q: To which side do you show your allegiance, party or constituency, and explain why?
JI: "Both. Because I think that a lot of the problems that we have in our constituency are the same problems that we have in this province. They are even and I think we can do both jobs at the same time."
TH: "That's the first time I've been asked that ques tion. I'm going to shoot right from the hip. It's constituency. I'm in this for guys just like myself. I am a business person. It is about everybody that is going to vote for me Luckily I think that the party behind me is a small business party, is a constituency party, is a rural party, not a metro-based party. I feel I'm going to be answering to my constituents, not to my party."

DPR: "I show my side to constituency. When Premier Dexter asked me to run the very first time I had a meet ing with him and I made it very clear to Mr. Dexter that if there was an issue that was very relevant to the majority of the constituency and the party had an opposing view, I told him that I would be working with the constituents. My approach is in a restorative manner so I would be trying to make sure the constituents would understand the party position but yet at the end of the day my stance would be with the constituency. I was very delighted in that conversation with Premier Dexter because he said, 'I understand that very much' and so it was important to him that he had a candidate that felt so strongly about its constituents."
Q: How are you going to respond to your constituents if your party fails to live up to any or all election promises?

JI: "First of all I think that Jamie has thought things through very, very carefully in constructing his plat form. He's a really careful guy. He's a really smart guy and that's one of the reasons why I'm with him and this party. I believe that he is going to live up to all of the promises he's put in that platform.

TH: "I feel my job is an advocate for everybody in my riding. If my party is letting me down or letting my constituents down it's my job to fight to make it right

I've been around for awhile. Every situation is different. That's a tough question to give a blanket answer to because there's going to be, these days the way technology changes, the way the world changes, every day is different and a lot of times you don't know in the morning what the end of the day is going to be like and what challenges you're going to face. It's very hard to tell you carte blanche how it's going to be handled but I'll do my best."

DPR: "We lived up to all of our promises. If you go back and look at the platform that we introduced we followed all those. The only one we did not follow was with respect to the increase in the HST. We did not have the opportunity to see the books of the province at the time and we were under the impression they were balanced books. The previous government had estimated offshore oil reserves of being much much higher than what they were and there was also a lot of pre-election spending. When we got in what we saw was the fact that there was a real problem in terms of the debt in this province. We're at a balanced budget. We made a commitment to Nova Scotians that we will reduce the HST and that will happen in 2014, it goes down a percentage, and then next year another percentage and then we'll be back to the percentage it was when we came into power"
Q: Of all the issues facing your riding what one do you see as ranking the highest in importance and what do you propose should be done to deal with it?

JI: "I think the lack of jobs is probably the biggest one in this constituency so what I've been doing as I go door to door over the past year is I've been asking people who own small and medium sized businesses ... I've been saying to them is, 'Look, if there are two things that a PC government could do for you to help you survive and thrive, what would they be?' and most of them are saying, 'Pull our taxes down a bit and get rid of a lot of this red tape because we're drowning in it,' and we have promised as a party that when we form government we will take the small business tax to zero and we will streamline the red tape."
TH: "I haven't prioritized each item as which is more important than the other. When I'm on the doorstep talking to people each individual they have a certain issue that is high. If I was forced to pick I would say it's the economic underpinnings of the community, of the riding. We have to support small business. That's what we need to build on, is people that are starting out in business are successful that we can give them a hand up, not a hand out ... Top is the local business and support of local business."

DPR: "It's the whole rural component and the struggle in rural communities. We have the oldest population in all of Canada. We have the oldest housing stock and that's why we created under Community Services the first housing strategy in the history of the province. It's about rural Nova Scotia and what we have to do in terms of all of those issues that fit under rural Nova Scotia. We do have a panel travelling the province and we'll soon get that report of what do we need to do differently in rural Nova Scotia to make it sustainable. I'm seeing success already in terms of work we've done for rural Nova Scotia, reducing the business tax by 40 per cent since we've been in helps the local economy. The ships contract that's going to have a major trickling effect in rural Nova Scotia. I think that we've already started to lay a strong foundation to move rural Nova Scotia into being more sustainable and successful."

Question: As an MLA, what's going to make you different and stand out from your competitors?
Pam Birdsall (PB): "I think what will make me stand out is that I've already had four years' experience being the MLA. It's a job. Like any job, the first year the learning curve is not steep, it's straight up. It's a very difficult job to learn. There's no handbook. I'm connected. I know who to deal with and how to deal with them and I know how to connect with my constituents because I've done that all over Lunenburg constituency. ... An MLA really needs to be out there talking to people and being 'on the ground.' One of the best things is being in a campaign because you talk to everybody all the time and yet I've been knocking on doors for four years and I've been talk ing to people and hearing their concerns and being able to take that to the caucus table. I've listened to people. I've helped solve problems and I'm an approachable per son. So I think I've done a good job and I hope to be able to continue to do a good job."
Suzanne Lohnes-Croft (SLC): "I think as an MLA I will reach out to the people and I will consult with people over issues that are important to them. I want to stay constantly in contact with people and I'll do that by going to events and visiting communities ..
Brian Pickings (BP): "I would have to say that I be lieve I come from, what I like to call, the real world. I'm a working man. I believe people should be on top. I think they've been on the bottom for far too long and being a strong advocate for all of the constituents regardless of political stripe is what I'd like to do. I think that people deserve better representation and I think they deserve to be told more like it is rather than a political answer. If you make a mistake they want to know you made a mis take. If somebody else is doing a good job they deserve to hear it. I think people are ready for that sort of change.'

Q: Fewer and fewer eligible voters bother to vote at election time. To a degree it's cynicism. What's your message to people who've lost their faith in politics and politicians?

PB: "It's a very difficult thing. It's true. Especially in recent times we're looking at federal politics and senators and people are just shaking their head very cynically and saying why should I bother. Well, I say you should bother because we live in a democracy and your vote counts and if you don't get out and vote and really put your voice out there on election day it's really hard afterwards to complain and say, 'You didn't do this, you didn't do that,' if you didn't get out and vote. So when I'm on the doorstop talking to people, when I'm on the phone talking to people ... the last thing I always say is just get out and vote. I guess by who you are, how you deal with things, you show by example that you might be someone worthy of their vote.

SLC: "I get that question a lot on the doorstep. Why

would you even go into politics is one of the number 1 questions and I say it's because I have hope for our communities and I have hope that small changes can add up to big changes. People who are really cynical I ask them the same question, 'Have you offered yourself up to public service and do you think if you did you could make changes?' It sort of stops the conversation."
BP: "I've listened to a lot of them tell me that. I encourage them to go out and vote ... I can't blame them for being cynics because I think our elected officials have done that to themselves. You need people in there that are going to treat people with more respect and treat them as if they're more intelligent than they are. I think for too long people have been doing this for the wrong reasons, maybe their own self-motivation, I don't know. But, for me, this will always be about the people."
Q: To which side do you show your allegiance, party or constituency, and explain why?
PB: "As the MLA my job is to listen to my constituents and be their voice at the caucus table. There's never been a situation that I've experienced, as representative of government, am I doing something totally against the wishes of constituents because there's so many people and so many opinions. It's never black and white. It's never that sort of thing. I have to say one of the things I'm really proud of is the fact that our government has been so consultative. There have been many, many consultations on many issues around the province. It sounds like I'm giving you a non-answer and yet it's a difficult question because my allegiance is to my constituents and I also represent the direction of the gov ernment. I think my role is to disseminate information so people understand exactly why decisions are made."

SLC: "I think at first you have to look at your constituency. Those are the people that put you in power. Those are the people you are representing. I do understand you have to follow the rules of caucus. I've been told that. I understand those rules. But I still think that as the MLA you need to take the concerns of your constituents to your caucus and lobby for your constituents so that you can provide them with the best representation possible."
BP: "Our leader, Jamie Baillie, when he first sat down with a lot of the candidates, he spelled out our duties and the number 1 duty is to our constituents. We should always be strong advocates for constituents because those are the people we're representing."

Q: How are you going to respond to your constituents if your party fails to live up to any or all election prom

PB: "I guess I would have to explain reasons why. Of our campaign platform last time in 2009 everything we said we would do, we did. The one thing of course that you hear is you said you weren't going to raise the HST and you did. ... Our coming in, in 2009, one year after a world economic meltdown - the worst depression since the Great Depression - New Democrats were lucky enough to inherit all that and inherit pretty empty cof fers. Now that we are back to balance and we are on a stronger foothold there is in legislation that we put forward that the next fiscal year one point will come off the HST and the following year the other point. That is legislation. That is what we're doing."


Progressive Conservative candidate Brian Pickings
SLC: "I have faith in [Liberal leader] Stephen McNeil and our Nova Scotia First program. It's supposed to be for the people and not for the political party. I intend to be there in good times and bad for our constituents. We've had some disappointing news employment-wise in Lunenburg constituency in the past couple of years and we didn't have a voice. We didn't hear anything from our MLA."

BP: "I would be sorely disappointed if we couldn't live up to them ... but I would like to believe that everything that our leader is saying and everything that our party is saying is very sincere. I would be disappointed myself and explaining that to a constituent would be very hard because really how can we say that we didn't do what we said we were going to do. That makes it the same as everybody else. That makes me the same as everybody else. I'm not the same as everybody else and our party's not the same. I'm hoping that's not going to happen and if it does happen I hope there's an actua reason and not an excuse
Q: Of all the issues facing your riding what one do you see as ranking the highest in importance and what do you propose should be done to deal with it?
PB: "I don't think I can answer that question. I can't say one thing is calling my attention or the government's attention. There are a number of things that are all on the same level, I would say. I would say health care, roads and education are all important. We're dealing with a lot of difficult issues. Nothing ever comes down to one question, one answer. It's very complex as everything is, which is why any government is juggling a lot of balls in the air all the time."
SLC: "Depending what community you're in and what age level you are addressing, I'm hearing two big issues. The Fishermen's Memorial Hospital, keeping it open, the emergency room, health care in general, having doctors; but the ferry has been a really hot issue on the doorstep. Tourism is an industry we can grow in Nova Scotia and shutting down that ferry has devastated some local businesses and some have just barely hung on but some have had to close their doors."
BP: "It's obvious to me that it's the employment in the area. We need more sustainable jobs. The private sector pays all the bills. If we want to support our social structure we need the economic foundation to do so. I believe that our party understands that this area has been built on small business and our platform clearly states that's what we want to do is kick-start that small business and the best way to serve your constituents in any capacity is by having the funding to do so.'

Question: As an MLA, what's going to make you different and stand out from your competitors?

Mark Furey (MF): "It goes back to my experience in the community and knowing the community through my previous profession. I was engaged with the commu nity at the education level, at the recreation level and got to know the community in a different way and it wasn't about politics. It was really about relationships and I felt quite comfortable with that and those experiences have really come forward to today, that the relationships are well established and it's resulted in some pretty significant support."
David Mitchell (DM): "I come with eight years of municipal political experience and what's great about that is you're absolutely responsible to your constituents. As a councillor you're fully independent and I know that when you step up provincially there is that party politics that comes into play. But I truly believe and my leader believes that it's constituents first. I believe that I'll return integrity to politics.'

Gary Ramey (GR): "I think there are a number of things ... I guess the first one would be super boards. I think ... the other candidates believe that we should try and centralize health care in Halifax with a giant bureaucracy. I think it's a bad idea because I think it will cost a fortune and it would cause chaos in the healthcare field. The biggest one I guess of all is the way we look at the finances. We have lowered the business tax but we'd never lower it to zero because we didn't think that's prudent. We are committed to the shipbuilding project. We are growing the economy. We're building more long-term-care beds."

Q: Fewer and fewer eligible voters bother to vote at election time. To a degree it's cynicism. What's your message to people who've lost their faith in politics and politicians?
MF: "That was probably the most frequent discussion on the doorsteps. But I understood and I shared that with them that their positions were justified based on past experience and I think, again, it comes back to communication and understanding that people have higher expectations of their elected officials. I felt the same in policing and that's where I came from in my work environment, knowing that people had a higher expectation of me. And I think in these circumstances that bodes well to any future role I may play as an elected official should the public support me.

DM: "I'm hearing that far too often at the door, that people have given up on the political system. I get where they're coming from but removing themselves from the democratic process doesn't make things better. It means

that your choice has been removed and you're not likely to get the person that really should be representing you as your MLA."
GR: "I think there's lots of good reasons that people have become disenchanted or disappointed with elected members. Practically as soon as I got elected there was that whole kerfuffle with MLAs that went back a number of years before I got elected but still it taints everybody. What bothers me is that maybe good quality people who care about their families and care about their own reputations might be a little gun-shy to get into politics because they do get stereotyped and branded with those kinds of accusations. Young people would have a very significant amount of political power should they decide to exercise their franchise. Policies made by government do have ... and will have a profound effect upon them."
Q: To which side do you show your allegiance, party or constituency, and explain why?
MF: "First and foremost it's about the constituency I had that discussion with Stephen McNeil and when I posed the question to him about those opportunities where he and I would differ he point blank said to me you have to speak with the best interests of your con stituents in mind and I valued that. It was the single factor that was most important to me in my decision to first seek the nomination in 2009 and I've carried through with that in my participating in the community. It was all about the residents of Lunenburg West."

DM: "Constituents first. The very first question asked Jamie Baillie when I met him was am I going to be allowed to vote against the party if it's in the best inter est of my constituents and his answer was absolutely. All of the PC candidates have been given that assurance from the leader that you represent the people before you represent the party."
GR: "Constituency. The constituents elected me and they expect me to represent them and what they have to say. Having said that I wouldn't be part of a party that felt wasn't interested in the issues that concerned them I hope they think that they have been in the past served well."

Q: How are you going to respond to your constituent if your party fails to live up to any or all election promises?

MF: "Those are going to be future challenges. For me it's about committing to do the best I can. Adhering to the commitments that we make to the public at large. That's very important to me. I can have some influence in that environment to ensure that the commitments that the leader and the party has made will be carried through to the best of our ability."
DM: "I would be very, very disappointed if we failed to live up to all of our election promises. I can't see a scenario where we aren't able to fulfil a four-year man date with that platform and I would be fighting for my constituents to make sure that we did."
GR: "We haven't made a lot of election promises this time that aren't part of the program we already started four years ago. There are things getting done. We need to do a lot more and we will be fulfilling the promises we made. I want the best outcome not only for my constituents but for all Nova Scotians.'

Q: Of all the issues facing your riding what one do you see as ranking the highest in importance and what do you propose should be done to deal with it?

MF: "Depending on where you are in the community, there's different issues and different priorities. When I think of the seniors population, the cost of living and their fixed income circumstances were most important to them as was health care. When I talk to young families with children, with them approaching school age or in school, education was most important to them. But in the collective discussion rural economic development and the opportunity to create employment would be the top issue, the number 1 issue in Lunenburg West."

DM: "Right now it's jobs and the economy. We have far too many people in this area unemployed. The rural economic engine has stalled and it's due to high power rates, high taxation. Health care and education are up there but you need a strong economy in order to pay for those services and until we get that going everything else is going to suffer."

GR: "It's health care on a couple of different levels. I need more doctors. The other side of that is long-termcare beds. And then we have to have supports in place to allow people who want to stay at home for the maximum amount of time. If you were to pick something that's on everybody's mind almost daily that they want looked after too it would be rural roads. Paving, chip sealing, ditching, cutting the bushes, new culverts, new bridges. Anything related to maintaining and doing upkeep on roads."

## Liberal, PC health plans threatens NDP progress on health care



NDP candidates Pam Birdsall, Gary Ramey, Denise PetersonRafuse and Sterling Belliveau are speaking up against the Liberal and Conservative plans to eliminate health boards in rural communities and centralize decision-making in Halifax.
"Cutting our district health authority is bad news for health care on the South Shore," says Pam Birdsall, NDP candidate in Lunenburg. "We have our own priorities and our own needs, and we need to be able to make our own decisions about how health care is delivered here."
"The Liberals and the PCs don't understand our health care needs," says Lunenburg West candidate Gary Ramey. "These are our families and our futures they're talking about.
This central bureaucracy would mean closed beds and ERs, nurses leaving and services cut. It's not worth the risk."

The last Liberal government cut 1600 hospital beds, and drove 1000 nurses out of the profession. Under the

Conservatives, ER closures were becoming a crisis by 2008.
"I'm proud of the steps forward the NDP has taken on health care," says Denise Peterson-Rafuse, running in Chester-St. Margaret's. "We're building new clinics to attract doctors to Liverpool and Bridgewater, opening the Fisherman's Memorial collaborative emergency centre, and we've hired 400 more doctors across the province."
This investment has been mirrored in spending on seniors' care, with 1000 long-term care beds added since 2009, and a commitment for 1100 more.
"The NDP has worked hard in the past four years to make things better for seniors," says Sterling Belliveau, candidate for Queens-Shelburne. "We've committed to improving and expanding long-term care on the South Shore, by building new and replacement beds, to make sure that seniors have access to the best possible care."

## NDP paving tops previous governments

Significant funding increases by the NDP government have begun to undo the damage of decades of under-investment in Nova Scotia's roads and highways. The government says its investment in paving proves its commitment to making Nova Scotia families safer.

The five-year paving plan added tens of millions of dollars in additional funding over previous years. Many roads across the South Shore have been paved or repaired, including major improvements to Highway 103.


# Investment in jobs spurring growth on the South Shore 

The NDP government's policy of direct investment in the province's regions has led to significant job growth here on the South Shore.

Chester-St. Margaret's NDP candidate Denise PetersonRafuse says that investments in Cedar Bay Grilling Company, SchoolHouse Gluten Free Gourmet, Jellett Rapid Testing and Nautel have created good local jobs on the South Shore.
"In addition" she says, "investments in Acadia

University and the Acadia Centre for Rural Innovation have protected good-paying jobs and helped lay the foundation for growth in the knowledge economy."
